CHAIR'S MESSAGE

On behalf of the Board, I'm pleased to present Drug ARM's 2023/24 Annual Report, in what is our organisation's 175th year of continuous service in Queensland.

Over the past financial year, Drug ARM assisted thousands of people and families through dedicated alcohol and other drug support and group programs.

Outcomes of support included helping people to address problematic alcohol and other drug use, improve health and wellbeing, connect with relevant services, set achievable goals and boundaries, better manage emotional responses, gain information, tools and strategies, rebuild confidence and repair troubled relationships.

During 2023-24, your support to individuals increased. A total of 10,709 alcohol and other drug counselling sessions were delivered (up 21.69% on the previous year), and as many as 2,290 group support sessions were held. Because you cared, we:

- connected with over 2.500 families
- provided education and support in correctional centres throughout Queensland
- and patrolled the streets to provide 9,043 occasions of support to people experiencing homelessness, an increase of 24% on the previous year.

While committed to delivering support, education and advocacy, we paused to reflect and give thanks to an enduring and rich history of service as Drug ARM's guiding body, The Drug Awareness & Relief Foundation (Australia), entered its 175th year.

To celebrate this significant milestone, various activities were held throughout the year in metropolitan and regional areas, allowing as many as possible supporters, donors, volunteers, students and staff to mark the occasion.



During this reflection, we acknowledged that it was community concern in relation to the harmful use of alcohol that prompted our mission. This led a group of church-affiliated and community volunteers to establish the Moreton Bay Temperance Society on 8 May 1849, founding our organisation.

Today, we continue to respond to concerns around problematic substance use, and mobilise volunteers, supporters and qualified teams to assist people and families to rebuild their lives.

I would like to take this formal opportunity to welcome Brad Strong, appointed to the role of Executive Director/CEO of Drug ARM in October 2023. I thank Brad for his first nine months of leadership, during which time he oversaw an expansion of our Street Outreach Services and Community and Family Support Services, several service relocations, a centre dedication, the outfitting of a new Op Shop in Kelvin Grove and increased our capacity in fundraising and business development.

Brad has also respectfully steered deliverance of our 175 Year celebrations with a focus on gratitude for the support that has underpinned and sustained this legacy of service.

Thanks also goes to the full Executive Team and my fellow Board Directors and Committee Members for their contributions and support throughout the year. Happy 175th everyone.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

In this, my first report as Executive Director, I honour the trust and faith placed in us by our valued supporters to deliver on a mission founded on community care 175 years ago.

We exist because we must.

People turn to substances for all kinds of reasons, and in times impacted by social stresses – such as the current housing and cost-of-living issues, we've seen additional challenges.

Thanks to your contributions, Drug ARM teams on the streets and in dedicated spaces stepped up and increased support, making a difference in community to people and their families.

Helping to meet the demand, were volunteer clinical students on placement at Drug ARM. A higher student intake delivered 3,438 counselling sessions during 2023-24, a sharp increase of 65% on the number of sessions delivered in the previous reporting period. Not only were more adults and families supported, but more students gained valuable workplace learnings.

Several Drug ARM services relocated throughout the financial year, moving into larger and more comfortable surrounds for clients in Mackay, lpswich and Toowoomba. I thank these teams for assisting with the moves, ensuring smooth transitions.

Drug ARM's parent organisation was also pleased to purchase a centre in Boggabilla, providing our local support team with greater security in relation to their program delivery. The centre was dedicated with a community celebration in June 2024.

In early 2024, two new leadership roles were created in support of our strategic goals. They were a Chief Services Officer and a Fundraising and Business Development Manager.



In May 2024, we secured a lease and fitted out a new Op Shop within the Kelvin Grove Urban Village. This expanding retail arm raises vital funds for our Street Outreach Services, which this financial year expanded its reach and support. We thank community supporters for allowing this expansion at a time when street outreach patrols encountered longer queues for assistance.

After serving on the organisation's Board for 12 years, I stepped into Drug ARM's Executive Director/CEO role on 3 October 2023. As a priority, I visited each of our services, and in meeting each team was struck by their dedication to the wellbeing of those seeking support.

I also give praise to our volunteers, around 250, and our donors, sponsors, partners and funders who have given in support of our mission. We simply can't thank you all often enough.

Early in my role, the organisation turned 175. We took the opportunity to gather with as many as we could in fitting celebrations, most of which are outlined in this report. Thank you to everyone who attended.

While inspiring to reflect, we are all too aware there is still much to be done. Our eyes remain forward as we get on with the job of providing alcohol and other drug support.

In closing, on behalf of the Drug ARM Executive, I thank our Board of Directors for their leadership and guidance. Thank you, one and all, and God Bless.

REACHING FURTHER

Your support allows us to do great things in communities. This year was no exception. This report showcases how your support was put into action and the impact it has had on thousands of people and families.

It was also a year of reflection as we entered 175 years of service. This milestone gave us an opportunity to be grateful for the community support we have received over this rich and robust history. As such, we have spent much of this year saying thank you to our supporters, past and present, for the legacy of care we all build upon today.

STREET OUTREACH SERVICES

Thanks to the support we receive through kind donations, monthly giving and our Op Shops, this financial year our Street Outreach teams increased support to people experiencing homelessness and alcohol and other drug issues.

Volunteer teams delivered a total of 9,043 incidences of care during the patrols, representing an increase of 24% on the previous year when 7,298 incidences of care were delivered.

An incident meant a hot cuppa in a hand on a cold winter night, a meaningful conversation, a referral to a support service, some crisis information provided or, at times, companionship over a barbeque lunch.

It takes a special kind of person to provide this support and we thank the 65 kind-hearted and committed volunteers who provided an impressive 280 patrols during 2023-24. Each patrol visited multiple sites, meeting anywhere from 10 to 40 patrons per site.

During 2023-24, patrols were conducted in six key locations across Queensland. They included visiting hotspot sites in Airlie Beach, Brisbane, Ipswich, Mackay, Maryborough and Toowoomba, with plans to launch a new service on the Gold Coast.

Often patrons waited in queues on street corners or in parks for an interaction with Drug ARM volunteers. Sadly, what our volunteers noticed this year was the larger number of matureaged patrons sleeping rough in both CBD and suburban areas.

Another heartbreaking issue identified was the reduction in food being made available by food relief organisations due to increased demand, which limited what we could access and provide to patrons.

In October 2023, we employed a Team Leader for our Brisbane night patrols, which has led to greater consistency around delivery. We welcomed Zach Pleming into this position.

NEW SITES

Thanks to the generous, ongoing support we received for Street Outreach, we were able to establish new sites during 2023-24.

They included:

- Thursday morning in Mackay from January 2024
- Monday lunchtime in partnership with Ipswich Railway RSL Sub Branch and the Salvation Army in Ipswich from April 2024
- various days launched at BHC housing complexes (Yeronga and Fortitude Valley) from July 2023
- Friday morning BBQ MOSHPIT in response to an invitation by Community and Elders at West End from May 2024
- Friday lunchtime BBQ MOSHPIT at 3rd Space (largest drop-in centre in Brisbane) from July 2023.

We thank our partners and are grateful for the support received from Brisbane City Council's Safer Communities Team, BHC - affordable housing, Community + (West End), Murri Watch (West End), 3rd Space, Ozharvest, Second Bite, Hope St Café, Ipswich Railway RSL Sub Branch and Ipswich Salvation Army.









JOSEPH'S STORY

While we were celebrating 175 years since foundation, another key milestone was reached in 2024 when we marked 35 years of delivering outreach. Wanting to acknowledge our outreach history, we spoke to Joseph, one of our earliest patrons.

Thirty-five years ago, in May 1989, concern and goodwill from community volunteers saw our first Street Outreach vans hit the streets.

Joseph's story begins when the service was still in its infancy in the early 1990s. At that time, volunteers went on patrols in Brisbane's suburbs, seeking to engage at-risk young people.

So, it was that an outreach team came across Joseph. He was a young teen, around 12 or 13, and was spending time at night wandering the streets in north-west Brisbane, drinking with mates.

Joseph says when he looks back on those years, it's through a haze of guilt and remorse. "We would drink and get drunk and then be bloody stupid," he said.

This entailed everything from damaging people's property to stealing whatever they could. While he came from a loving family, he had fallen in with friends who liked to drink and wreak havoc.

Except for those nights when the Drug ARM team visited his local skate park. On those nights, he and his friends chose to wait for the team to arrive to engage in a friendly chat. "I looked forward to them coming," he said. "They would listen and give advice... it's something I'll never forget."


Joseph said the Drug ARM chats would keep him out of trouble for at least that night and sometimes ended with getting a lift to a safe place. "The visits left a real, life-lasting impression on me," he said.

Despite the care shown by our outreach team, he was not ready to be shaped by it, and in his later teens and early adult life, became dependent on methamphetamine. Eventually, he started to see the impact his problematic drug use was having on those around him and got the help he needed through several intensive support programs, putting the drug use behind him.

What's so amazing about his story, is that now, every second Friday night, he gets ready and goes out behind the wheel of a Drug ARM Street Outreach van. "I want to repay the community in a positive way for all that I did back then," he said.

Because he's been on the other side of receiving, Joseph has much to give. He is open with patrons about his lived experience, which helps put them at ease.

"They talk to you because they know you're listening and not judging. It's surprising how much they share. They tell you when they're cold and need a blanket, when they last ate...



ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG TREATMENT

INDIVIDUAL COUNSELLING

Over the past financial year, your support enabled us to deliver a total of 7,108 individual counselling sessions to 1184 adult clients in community. Of these sessions, about 47% were delivered by our Community and Family Support Services (CAFSS) in Brisbane South and Ipswich.

Other counselling sessions were delivered through Creating Options and our Day Programs, which supported people experiencing severe and complex issues related to substance use. They were also delivered through our other family programs, including Breakthrough for Families and Toowoomba's Family Support Program.

GROUP PROGRAMS

411 group sessions were held for adults seeking alcohol and other drug support durina 2023-24.

These were delivered through our Day Program at Ipswich which ran 292 groups and through our Creating Options program which ran 119 groups.

ABOUT AOD COUNSELLING

Drug ARM's alcohol and other drug counselling and support provides clients with tools, information and strategies to turn their lives around and reduce or cease harmful substance use.

Our Day Program is a non-residential, intensive program, providing a structured approach to recovery through group sessions, individual support, and skill-building activities.

Clients have a chance to learn helpful and practical techniques such as emotional regulation, communication and conflict resolution skills, anger management and relationship building.

CHRISTIAN'S STORY

In the lead-up to Men's Health Week 2024, we spoke with a client who had been engaging in counselling with Drug **ARM's Community and Family Support** Services for just under a year.

When we first met *Christian in August 2023, he had reached "a dark space".

His long-term use of methamphetamine had led to a number of serious life events. He had separated from his wife after a long marriage, lost his job, been in a road accident and was steadily getting himself into deeper legal trouble and putting his safety at risk, including one day being stabbed.

"I was tired of the rollercoaster ride that I'd been on the for the past few years and so I got the courage to make the call (to Drug ARM). I really wanted to make a difference to my life..." he said.

Even so, making the initial call to Drug ARM proved difficult.

"I was ashamed and scared to pick up the phone and ask for help. I didn't know what my peers would think of me. But, now in my mid-forties, I know I'm not getting any younger..."

After participating in counselling, Christian has been able to fulfil some life goals. He has since completed a certificate course at TAFE and enrolled in a diploma. He guit smoking and implemented boundaries to help prevent substance use triggers.

"They've helped me get a lot clearer around boundaries," he said. "I close my doors to people that I need to. It has helped with managing my emotions and understanding my triggers around anxiety and depression, especially around bumping into old peers. They've helped me to open my eyes and get a lot clearer.

"I'm finally growing up... and have all these new beginnings. I believe with my life experience, I can make an impact - I really want to make a difference in community and give back what I took."

CREATING OPTIONS IN PROFILE

95% of Creating Options clients who responded to our feedback survey said they were satisfied to very satisfied with the Drug ARM counselling program they participated in.

GENDER

Creating Options' clients mostly identified as male (51.9%) while (47.2%) identified as female and 0.9% identified as neither male or female, or did not provide a gender response.

AGE

Creating Options is an adult treatment service receiving referrals for people aged 18 years and over.

The age breakdown among clients by gender was as follows:


- Of our male clients, most were aged between 35 and 44 years, followed by the 25-34 age group and then the 45 to 54 group.
- Of our female clients, most were aged between 25 and 34 years, followed by the 35 to 44 age group and then the 45 to 54 group.

Our youngest Creating Options client was aged 16 years, and our oldest was aged 74.

YOUTH AND **FAMILY PROGRAMS**

This year you've helped connect 2,565 families and significant others.

Our teams provided these families with information about alcohol and other drugs and, at times, gave them tools and strategies to help in the support of a loved one who has a problem with substance use. Often when a partner or a teen or adult child has a problem with substance use, breakdowns in relationships result. The program worked to provide empathy, understanding and practical tools for helping families improve their communication, coping skills, mental health, and boundary setting, in support of greater cohesiveness during what can be a difficult time.

Family members connected with one of our three family programs:

- > Breakthrough for Families Queensland (BFFQ), delivered broadly across 21 locations in 4 regions
- Community and Family Support Service (CAFSS) which sees people for their own substance use issues as well as significant others
- and our dedicated Toowoomba-based Family Support Program.

BREAKTHROUGH FOR FAMILIES OUEENSLAND (BFFO)

In all, a total of 1,693 people attended a BFFQ group information session during 2023-24, with 140 groups being held in community or online. The BFFQ teams held 463 family counselling sessions.

In this reporting period, our teams were involved in running successful alcohol and other drug information and education sessions in communities, including tailored sessions in Toowoomba for multicultural families and TAFE students, and regular sessions at a homelessness drop-in centre in Mackay.

We partnered with our Outreach services in Mackay and Airlie Beach, strengthened our community connections in the Ipswich region through Beddown and community centres, held a variety of workshops including ones with a focus on mocktails and budget meals, and for the first time attended Farmfest in Toowoomba and the Cunnamulla Lights Festival.

BFFO HIGHLIGHTS 2023-24

EVENTS IN COMMUNITY

Our BFFQ teams are often in community attending events to help increase awareness around AOD, make valuable connections and gain a better understanding of community issues. Some of the places and events where our teams provided information, often with pop-up stalls, included:

- Farmfest and Cunnamulla Lights Festival a first for our teams
- NAIDOC Week and Mental Health Week events
- > Kingaroy Community Services and Health Expo
- > Show Days (Tara, Dirranbandi, Dalby, Roma, St George, Charleville)
- > Roma Library Book Club (workshop)
- > Festivals and local shopping centres etc.









AOD EDUCATION IN MACKAY

In Mackay, our BFFO team attended the homelessness drop in centre, CHANCES House, every Thursday morning. The centre provides a safe space where people experiencing homelessness can have breakfast and have access to clothing, blankets, activities, a lounge area and information and support from a range of representatives from community and health services. People and their families benefitted from having regular access to AOD information and support.

BFFQ PARTNERSHIP

Our BFFQ Mackay Team has been working closely with other service agencies including mental health workers to provide AOD information and support to their clients' families. We have also been working in collaboration with the YWAM Chapter (Youth with a mission), Whitsunday Housing and a dedicated volunteer, Patrick, who runs his own clothing brand, Airlie Beach Crew. Through these community connections, in January 2024, our Family Support Facilitator, Barb, began co-ordinating regular Drug ARM Street Outreach support to sites in Mackay and Airlie Beach. The Airlie Beach

outreach service has attracted support from local paramedics who occasionally attend to help check in and connect with patrons.

BFFQ's participation in the outreach service brings the program into contact with members of the community who support, donate or volunteer, kickstarting valuable conversations about the program towards reaching more families.

THANK YOU, PATRICK

A very special thank you to Airlie Beach volunteer, Patrick, who this year generously started donating food for a Street Outreach BBQ in Airlie Beach.

A FAMILY STORY

This year, a father contacted Whitsunday Housing regarding his daughter who was sleeping in her van and needed assistance. The housing service went on to refer the to Drug ARM's BFFQ program, as his daughter had a problem with substance use.







The father shared that he had travelled from Western Australia to see his daughter, who had come to the Whitsundays to "live the dream of working on the islands and travelling in a van". However, her new lifestyle led to an introduction of methamphetamine (ICE) and, due to other environmental factors, she developed a dependence upon it.

Her father only became aware of her substance use issues when he visited and became "distressed and upset". Thanks to support from BFFQ and Street Outreach, along with other services, the young woman received the support she needed and has since travelled to another Queensland region where she has reconnected with other family and is looking to engage in AOD support.

ROMA LIBRARY & BOOK CLUB

Our BFFQ team in Roma is grateful this year for the support received through the Maranoa Regional Council. In particular, the program has benefitted from wonderful support from the local library and its book club. We thank the library for providing information about the BFFQ program to community members and helping link local families to it.

TOOWOOMBA TAFE ADD EDUCATION

Our Toowoomba BFFO team this financial year continued to provide AOD education to Toowoomba TAFE students studying Cert. IV and Diplomas in Community Services, Youth Work, Child Youth & Family Intervention, Legal Studies, and Nursing. We have been running the sessions at the local TAFE on invitation from the teachers for the past two years.

Feedback this year included such comments as:

YOUNG PEOPLE AND VAPING

In March 2024, Drug ARM Toowoomba's Family Support Facilitators joined other service providers, Lives Lived Well and Family Drug Support, to talk to teachers and other educators about the range of free alcohol and other drug support programs available. We thank Queensland Health AOD and Dovetail for this great opportunity to present at their well-attended "Young People and Vaping Workshop", held online and at Toowoomba State High School. The free session was open to Queensland educators and any staff who work directly with young people aged 12-17. We enjoyed being part of this excellent collaborative effort between South West Queensland health services.

MULTICULTURAL AOD EDUCATION, TOOWOOMBA

In late 2023, our Toowoomba's BFFQ team was approached by police and community service representatives about running AOD education for concerned members of the multicultural community. In response, our team began meeting with community members to gain better cultural understandings and awareness. and to hear directly from families about their concerns regarding peer influence and the introduction of substance use, as well as a need for more information about the signs and effects of substance use. The first of these AOD education sessions was subsequently held at our Toowoomba office in May 2024. More sessions are planned.

FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM - TOOWOOMBA

This family program provided support within the Toowoomba region for a range of emotional and mental health issues and concerns.

As such, we worked more intensively with each family, providing a total of 99 intervention sessions. The program also delivered 69 group sessions.

Groups included the launch of the Triple P Parenting Program, which commenced on 30 April 2024. Participation in this positive parenting program is on the rise.

ENGAGEMENT HIGHLIGHTS

Our program's Family Case Worker welcomed the opportunity to share insights about healthy relationships and self-confidence with high school students at a NAIDOC Community event in July 2023. This was arranged through a Teen Connection group at Harristown State High School.



CLIENT STORY

Our Family Support Program was honoured to support a mother and her teen son through the stress of a medical intervention, which involved the son undertaking major surgeries. It was a privilege to support this family as they faced this life-changing and potentially life-threatening treatment. We are pleased we could assist the Mum by providing her with strategies and a safe space for her to share her emotional responses.

PERSONAL HIGHLIGHT

Our program's Family Case Worker, Terri, raised around \$500 this financial year for Drug ARM through her own fundraiser, I Can Do Hard Things, which involves her personal challenge to run a full marathon in 2025. She will continue to raise money up until the event is held. Money raised is put towards Drug ARM's Street Outreach Services.















TARGETED EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAMS

NORTHERN NSW AND GOONDIWINDI

Your support made its way to regional areas where we provided early intervention programs. These involved individual and group support to young people and their families within the rural communities of Queensland's Goondiwindi and NSW's Boggabilla, along with outreach to Toomelah.

GROUPS

Thanks to you, our teams delivered over 200 group sessions throughout 2023-24, including playgroups, parenting groups and life skill sessions. These groups were aimed at providing information, support and community connections for families. They also allowed for timely alcohol and other drug early interventions and check-ins.

BEFORE SCHOOL BREAKFASTS

A key support our teams delivered during the reporting period was to provide local school children with a cooked breakfast before school. setting them up well for a day of concentration and learning. The breakfasts were served two times per week in Boggabilla and once a week in Toomelah.

CULTURAL AND PRACTICAL SUPPORTS

Our dedicated teams worked with families to provide cultural and practical supports including assistance with transport to medical and other essential appointments, mentoring, information, holiday activities and referrals.

CORRECTIVE SERVICES

This year you've helped us be there for people who were in Queensland Correctional Centres, or on probation or parole, due to drug-related offences.

A key aim of our support was to ensure that when they returned to community, they had the information, tools, strategies and support networks they needed to rebuild their lives and go on to make positive choices around their health and wellbeing.

A total of 1465 alcohol and other drug information and support groups were held, with the vast majority of those held in correctional centres.

In community, 2955 one-to-one counselling sessions were attended by those referred to us by Community Corrections. This counselling was provided across 17 sites in Queensland.

We thank the following correctional centres for their assistance throughout the year; Southern Queensland, Wolston, Arthur Gorrie, Brisbane, Brisbane Women's, Woodford, Numinbah, Palen Creek, Maryborough and Capricornia.

KEY **STATISTICS**

1,336 groups delivered in a correctional centre

589 individuals participated in counselling at our community corrections hubs

2,955 counselling sessions to people on probation or parole

NEW PILOT GROUPS

Drug ARM developed two new group programs to be delivered as part of the Oueensland Corrective Services programs. The first was a prep program aimed at orienting participants towards helping them understand what it is like to engage in a group, raise their motivation for treatment and help identify the pathway for further learning that will best suit them.

The second group was a maintenance program to be delivered a few months after they have completed one of our other programs. This group focuses on reinforcing the strategies that they have learnt and builds on this learning to help maintain their treatment goals.

95% of group participants rate their strategies for dealing with their alcohol and drug use as "excellent" or "good"

97% of group program participants rate the information they have received in the program as "excellent" or "good"

EDUCATION

OUR LIBRARY

We congratulate our library on 40 years of lending alcohol and other drug resources.

This year our Annerley-based library had 6,124 resources available for loan. Our dedicated librarian assisted with information requests. improving library access, growing our collection, providing a chill-out zone and celebrating our history.

IMPROVED ACCESS TO ONLINE **RESOURCE DATABASE**

This financial year, our library began working to provide our workforce with greater access to EBSCO's electronic database of over 6 billion resources covering all kinds of subject matter. The resources also include a wide range of alcohol and other drug and mental health journals and articles.

By September 2024, our staff and volunteers, even those working in remote areas, were able to search and download full test articles from any device anywhere, using a single sign-on.

LIBRARY HISTORY

Our librarian consulted with former and current staff and did research to compile a timeline of our library's history. The timeline was displayed in the Annerley library to celebrate 40 years of library services along with our organisation's 175th anniversary. Key dates are shown below:

TRAINING

Drug ARM partnered with Queensland schools and other government and non—government agencies to help raise awareness and understanding of alcohol and other drug use and associated harm reduction strategies through delivery of specialist training. Out training initiatives during 2023-24 included:

- Salvation Army Stafford: a lunchbox session was facilitated with a focus on alcohol and other drug awareness and interventions. In attendance were Family Support workers who engaged in an open forum discussion.
- > Transport and Main Roads staff: training on Managing Difficult Callers.



- > BUSY Schools: Alcohol and Other Drug Awareness presentations delivered to students (aged 16 to 19) who have completed Year 10 but are experiencing difficulties or are disengaged from school. Presentations occurred at the following BUSY Schools campuses:

The 10-storey, alcohol-free hotel was located in central Brisbane and was run by our organisation for 56 years (1929-1985). Hotel revenue was used to help fund alcohol and other drug advocacy and education activities, which included our dedicated library.

HAPPY FOUNDATION DAY

Our organisation was founded on 8 May, 1849, with the forming of the Moreton Bay Temperance Society. Fast forward 175 years, on 8 May, 2024, and Drug ARM teams celebrated this momentous occasion by gathering for morning teas across nine locations. The events gave teams an opportunity to reflect on the legacy they have inherited and continue to deliver on today, as well as enjoying some fun with their colleagues.






The Foundation commissioned the writing of the book to capture the highlights, key figures and memorable moments in honour of 175 years of service.

SUPERVISION

In 2023-24, our clinical staff had access to internal, external and group supervision, with 92 internal sessions provided by 22 supervisees and 115 group sessions delivered. Staff also had access to our Clinical Lead for more immediate secondary consultations if they required onthe-job advice. During the reporting year, 236 secondary consultations were provided. All new clinical staff attended induction training as part of our onboarding process, with 51 induction sessions held throughout the past financial year.

OUR VOLUNTEERS

We are truly grateful for our 250 volunteers who provided dedicated and caring service during 2023-24. Each volunteer generously gave time, effort and skill towards ensuring people had someone to turn to and who would listen and respond with care and compassion.

During National Volunteer Week 2024, Drug ARM's Executive Director Brad Strong said that our volunteers were the backbone of our organisation. "We can't thank them enough for all that they do to make real, transformative differences in people's lives."



MEET EMMELINE

At the end of the financial year, we were looking for a special someone who could help lead and manage our growing volunteer team. Thanks to the increase in our CAFSS student intake this year, we saw about a 70% lift in our overall volunteer numbers on what we had the previous year.

As such, we welcomed Em, our new Volunteer Co-ordinator. A volunteer herself, who had been working in one of our Op Shops, and with a background in managing a hospital's mental health unit, Em was the perfect fit to lead and inspire our amazing team.

STUDENTS

Most our volunteers, 145 of them, were students on placement with our Community and Family Support Service (CAFSS).

Of those students, 92 worked in Annerley and 53 in Ipswich. The program provided students an opportunity to work with clients presenting with low to moderate service needs. The typical progression of a CAFSS student is a six-month placement which involves delivery of free cocounselling.

In the past financial year, we took students from various bodies including ACAP, Griffith University, Queensland University of Technology, University of Queensland, Western Sydney University, Monash University, Open Colleges, Australian College of Community Services, Australian Institute of Professional Counsellors. TAFE, Torrens University, Stotts College Brisbane Campus, Upskilled, Christian Heritage College, IKON Institute of Australia and Australian College of Ministries.

OUR CAFSS PROGRAM EVALUATED

During this year, our Community and Family Support Service (CAFSS) program was evaluated from the perspective of its effectiveness as a workforce development program.

We found that students and volunteers were highly satisfied with the program and were much more likely to consider working in the alcohol and other drug sector after completing a placement in CAFSS. We are looking at better ways to promote the program to our partners in the sector and how to quantify the learnings and capabilities gained through the program.



MEET LEANNE

This year, in the lead-up to National Volunteer Week 2024, we talked to one of our longest serving outreach volunteers, Leanne, who has served a total of eight years over two separate stints.

Leanne volunteers at our Aspley outreach site every Thursday when a free barbecue lunch is provided to about 10-15 people doing it tough and experiencing homelessness.

"I don't judge how they (our patrons) look or where they live... I come as a friend to show kindness and I want to be there for them so they don't have to feel so alone," Leanne said.

"They always have a back story - you just never know a person's history and what they've been through.

Leanne's compassion and understanding

perhaps stems from her own lived experiences. She said some of her earliest memories were of alcohol and other drug misuse and associated violence which occurred in her childhood home.

"I think it's why I can have real empathy for the struggles people have with alcohol and drugs and can understand the effects it has on the whole family," she said.

When it comes to doing street outreach, Leanne feels it's a good use of her support skills, which she developed previously when working in crisis phone support.

"It's a pleasure to be there - I love working faceto-face. While they will talk about their darkest moments, and it is an honour that they share those with you, generally it is just an all-round great feeling as you get to see their strength and resilience and be amazed at what they can live through," she said. "There's a real community feel to the group - they enjoy some banter and they like to support each other."

"After all the stories I've heard, I think I can't be shocked any more, but then I am."

We thank our extraordinary volunteers who teamed up and went out in vans to conduct night or day Street Outreach shifts in hotspots across various Queensland locations in support of people sleeping rough who may have issues with alcohol and other drugs.

To go out and meet waiting queues on street corners in all kinds of weather takes a special kind of person and we were lucky to have 65 such kind-hearted, inspirational and proactive people working with us during 2023-24.

Teams provided patrons with a free hot cuppa or some other refreshment or donation, a chat and some crisis information or referral to a service for support. Often patrons valued the friendly interaction, the smile, the respect and the sense of hope that came from knowing that there were people and services who cared.


RETAIL OP SHOP WORKERS

Since 1999, Drug ARM has been sending volunteers to the Gold Coast for end-of-year Schoolies Week celebrations to help keep young school leavers safe by providing free water, check-ins and a Recharge Zone.

Schoolies Week 2023 was no exception. Attending the event were 18 Drug ARM volunteers who provided a total of 405 volunteer hours. They handed out 31,500 cups of water and assisted 69 young people.






WHERE FUNDING FOR DRUG ARM'S PROGRAMS CAME FROM IN 2023/24
